1. What are the main features of, and differences between standards of protection for geographical indications under Article 22 TRIPS and the "additional protection" for geographical indications under Article 23 TRIPS?
2. In addition to its role negotiating international trade agreements, the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative has a reporting role and an enforcement role in the trade relations of the United States under U.S. law. Briefly describe how the USTR performs those roles.
3. What is the difference between a "violation complaint" and a "non-violation complaint" in the WTO-GATT dispute settlement process, and what is the relevance of that distinction for dispute settlement under the TRIPS Agreement Article 64(3) and the newly revised Article 31*bis*?
4. What are "genetic resources, traditional knowledge, and folklore" as recognized by international agreements, and why are they now part of the WTO TRIPS agenda?
5. To what extent and to what effect was the Vienna Convention on the Law of Treaties used as an interpretive tool by the WTO panel in its decision in *U.S. - Section 110(5) of the U.S. Copyright Act*?
